



Major and Cumulative GPA requirements. I understand my major AND cumulative GPA must be at least a 3.0 to be admitted into HIS 390 and student teach. The student teaching placement process may not begin until I have a 3.0

I plan to register and take the Social Science-History Content Exam ASAP. I understand that I must complete Gateway 1 milestones and pass the content exam prior to registering for HIS 290 and student teaching. There is about a 50% pass rate, so allow sufficient time to pass the exam prior to student teaching.

____Make arrangements for transportation during your student teaching semester. You will be commuting to campus and various locations during History 390 and to your student teaching site. Your student teaching commute could be up to an hour.

 Center (LTEC) Student Teaching Agreement Form. This form is at the following

- 2. I understand, as a History-Social Science Education major, that I must complete a full application for student teaching during the fall semester of the year prior to student teaching, which includes: Application, Resume, Official Transcripts, LTEC Student Teaching Agreement Form, Student Teaching Preference Form, Portrait Essay, Gateway 2 Interview Questions and History Department Student Teaching Agreement Form.
- 3. I understand that I must attend required meetings, check and respond to my emails and phone calls in a <u>timely</u> fashion, apply for graduation, request overrides when needed, and meet with my advisor on a regular basis.
- 4. I understand that I must complete my plan of study and required classes prior to being admitted to student teach and must earn a C or better in my professional education, major plan of study, and endorsement classes.
- I understand that I must complete Gateway 1 milestones and pass the Social Sciences-History Content Exam prior to registering for History 290.
- 6. I understand that, according to the 10-12 catalog and beyond, I must have a GPA of 3.0 overall and in the major in order to be permitted into History 390 & Student Teaching.
- 7. I understand that I must earn a C or better in Student Teaching and achieve a passing score on the state mandated edTPA portfolio assessment in order to graduate and become licensed to teach.
- 8. I understand that in my student teaching semester I register for the two sections of student teaching (10 credits) according to my major (History Social Science Education) and history 390 (3 credits) section 1 or 2 according to my student teaching region.
- 9. I understand that the History Department offers the opportunity to student teach in either Central Illinois or the Chicagoland area, that spaces are limited, and that I might not get my first choice location. I am willing to take a student teaching placement in a different region or wait a semester to student teach. I understand that student teaching might require a substantial commute or relocation for the student teaching semester. I also understand that securing a placement will be extremely difficult due to poor grades shown on a transcript.
- 10. I understand it is my responsibility to notify the Director of Student Teaching and my advisor of changes in my contact information and student teaching plans. I understand that if I change my student teaching semester I will need to reapply.
- 11. I understand that the Director of Student Teaching, Fred Walk, does the placement of student teachers in History-Social Science Education. Self placement, student teaching at your home high school or with family members is not allowed.




